r. Mark Studeny, professor and chair of the department of cardiology at the Marshall University Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine, has been named the inaugural Bernard C. and Pansy P. Wellington Professor of Cardiology.

The professorship is funded by a generous \$800,000 gift facilitated by Robert H. Beymer, chairman of the board of First Sentry Bank and trustee of the Bernard C. and Pansy P. Wellington Foundation. The gift will support medical education and cardiovascular research at the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine. Cardiovascular disease remains the No. 1 cause of death in our region, as well as the United States. The endowment provides opportunities to explore new avenues available for prevention and treatment of cardiovascular disease.

"It is a tremendous honor to be named as the first Wellington Professor," Studeny said. "We are grateful for this wonderful gift which will benefit the people of our region. I am excited to expand our work into the disease processes that affect so many in our area."

"Pansy Wellington graduated from Marshall, and she absolutely loved the school," Beymer said. "She was a kind, caring person, and I know Pansy would be pleased that so many people will be helped through this gift to the School of Medicine."

Dr. and Mrs. R. Mark Hatfield share their time, talent and resources with the schools and communities that have shaped their lives.

Mark Hatfield, M.D., is the great-grandson of Devil Anse Hatfield, the infamous leader of the Hatfield clan during the legendary Hatfield-McCoy feud of the 1800s. He is also a renowned ophthalmologist, a noted educator and a loyal supporter of the Marshall University Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine – but if there's one thing Dr. Hatfield learned growing up in the Hatfield family, it's never to forget his Appalachian roots.

"There are a lot of wonderful aspects of our mountain culture," he said. "Our ancestors took care of strangers who were passing through. Everyone was welcome to their home and their food. Giving was part of the culture back then, and it's still a part of our heritage today. I learned as a young boy that it's better to give than to receive and that it's my responsibility to serve my family, my friends and those I don't know."

It is with those childhood lessons as his guide that Hatfield embarked on a lifetime of generosity that has pervaded his professional career, his scholastic pursuits and his personal philosophy.

After earning a doctorate degree in optometry, Hatfield attended the Marshall School of Medicine, Class of 1983, with plans to pursue a career in ophthalmology. However, while at Marshall, he was drawn instead to cardiovascular-thoracic surgery and was intending to change his specialty – until destiny intervened in the form of a winsome redhead named Monica, a graduate student working toward her master's degree in math education. The two were married just seven months after they met.

"With a little coaxing from Monica, I decided to go into ophthalmology," said Hatfield, who went on to attend the Illinois Eye & Ear Infirmary in Chicago for his ophthalmology residency.

At Illinois Eye, Hatfield's first rotation happened to be the retina rotation.

"I fell in love," he said. "I had landed in retina heaven. It was exactly where I was meant to be."

Upon completing his residency in 1987, Hatfield remained in Chicago to complete vitreoretinal fellowship

training under the direction of Dr. Kirk Packo and Dr. David Orth at Rush Presbyterian-St. Luke's. Retina was an emerging subspecialty at the time, and Hatfield's extensive training placed him at the forefront of his field. Instead of remaining in Chicago or moving to another large city to practice, he chose to return to his home state.

"Mark always had it in his heart that he wanted to help West Virginians," Mrs. Hatfield said. "Retina was a brand-new and much-needed specialty when we left Chicago, and we could have ended up many other places, but he wanted to come back home. He's practiced for 26 years now, and helping the people of West Virginia has always been his goal."

In 1988, Hatfield founded Retina Consultants, a group that has grown exponentially over the years to provide eye care throughout the state of West Virginia as well as into Ohio, Kentucky and Virginia. When he opened the practice, he was the first fellowship-trained retinal surgeon in southern West Virginia, providing care that until then could only be found three or four hours away.

Today, Retina Consultants has offices in Beckley, Parkersburg, Charleston, Huntington, Logan and Point Pleasant. Hatfield and his partners see patients with diabetes and macular degeneration, the two leading causes of blindness in the United States. His passion for his work has attracted other retina specialists to the practice, including David J. Hunt, M.D., Marshall School of Medicine Class of 1995, and Scott C. Jamerson, M.D., Marshall School of Medicine Class of 2004.

"I met Dr. Hatfield in my first semester of medical school, and I didn't even know what an ophthalmologist was, much less a retinal surgeon," Dr. Jamerson said. "Dr. Hatfield happened to be teaching a neuroanatomy class at that time, and I spent some time with him in clinic. I may not have known what a retinal surgeon was, but I knew I wanted to be one."

"Mark is one the smartest people I know, and he is the reason I joined the practice," Dr. Hunt said. "There's no problem that he doesn't want to sit down and solve. He is a compassionate and involved doctor, an inquisitive and curious scientist and one of the most energetic human beings I've ever met."

To Hatfield, however, investing time, effort and energy into his patients is not extraordinary. It is simply the right thing to do.

"I'm just doing what my mission has been to do," he said. "There's nothing for me to boast about. It's just the right thing to do, to use your gifts and abilities to help others." Dr. and Mrs. Hatfield agree that helping others means giving back to the communities and institutions that

supported them along the way, including the university and medical school that brought them together.

"I can't say enough about my experience at Marshall," Hatfield said. "The hands-on education I was provided, the instructors who mentored me and the lifelong friends I made all shaped my life – and I wouldn't have met Monica if I hadn't gone to Marshall."

The first member of her family to earn a four-year degree, Mrs. Hatfield earned her undergraduate degree in chemistry and attended the Marshall School of Medicine for one year before deciding she wanted to be a math teacher, a career she enjoyed for 22 years.

"I grew up in Charleston, and I attended Marshall because my parents promised me a car if I went," she said. "When I graduated, they came through on their promise – and I totaled the car a month later on a trip to see Mark. But by then Marshall had already changed my life. It made Mark and me the people we are today. We give back to the university to help other students have that same experience."

From academic departments to athletic programs to facilities for the marching band, the Hatfields' support of Marshall University is far reaching. Mrs. Hatfield served on the board of directors for the Marshall University Foundation Inc. for 18 years and continues to serve on several advisory boards and committees for the university. However, the medical school in particular has a special place in their hearts and memories.

"Mark was a member of one of the first classes, and we honestly didn't know whether the school would be open the next day, the next week or the next year because we never knew whether funding would come in," Mrs. Hatfield said. "Part of why we support the school is because we don't want present students to be in that situation."

The Hatfields have three daughters – Meghan Hatfield Yanacek, Mary Hatfield Cumberledge and Makenzie Hatfield Kresch. Makenzie is currently attending the School of Medicine, and Mary's husband, Jeremy Cumberledge, is a member of the School of Medicine Class of 2012. The family's first-hand knowledge of the debts incurred by



today's medical students has sparked Dr. and Mrs. Hatfield's latest gift as part of the school's new "Adopt a Medical Student" scholarship program.

"We were fortunate 30 years ago to come out of medical school with relatively minimal debt, but kids today are coming out with a massive debt burden," Hatfield said. "Anything we can do to help with that burden is the right thing to do."

The "Adopt a Medical Student" concept enables alumni to support an individual student at the school and, over the course of the four-year sponsorship of that student, endow a scholarship fund that will benefit students to come. The Hatfields have supported Frank Fofie, a second-year medical student who was selected by the School of Medicine's Scholarship Committee in cooperation with the Office of Student Financial Assistance, since August 2013.

Linda Holmes, director of development and alumni affairs, said she is thankful to the Hatfields for jumping on board with the "Adopt a Medical Student" program.

"We are so pleased to develop scholarship programs at the School of Medicine that assist our students with the cost of their education, and Mark and Monica were the first to step up and say 'yes' to our new "Adopt a Medical Student" program," she said. "There are people who give their time, there are people who give their talents and there are people who give their resources – and then there are the Hatfields, who embody all three on a regular basis." A longtime professor in the School of Medicine, Hatfield was recently named chair of the Department of Ophthalmology.

"Mark Hatfield is a true 'son of Marshall' and a role model of a West Virginian," said Joseph I. Shapiro, M.D., dean of the Marshall University Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine. "After his education at Marshall, he trained in the very top ophthalmology and retina training programs in the country, but he returned to West Virginia rather than join or open a lucrative, urban practice elsewhere. We are absolutely delighted that he is joining our faculty as the new chair of ophthalmology."

Driven by moral and religious convictions and a shared belief in the power of education, the Hatfields are confident in where they choose to invest their time and support.

"We have both been blessed with educational opportunities, and that was because people before us helped us along the way," Hatfield said. "We've been blessed, and part of our responsibility is to share that and help those who follow behind us. It ties into our strong religious beliefs to help others. Giving back has always been an easy decision for us."

Hatfield credits his wife for supporting and guiding him through his career.

"Monica has always supported me," he said. "She raised three beautiful, successful daughters almost entirely on her own, and she has made incredible sacrifices. And now

Marshall medical students provide treatment to more than a thousand Hondurans during international mission

team of Marshall University Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine students, faculty physicians, a medical resident and other health care workers from the Tri-State community traveled to Honduras July 6-12, 2014, for an international mission that resulted in medical care for nearly 1,060 patients.

One of the students described the experience as a seminal event in his life. The Marshall team provided health care to men, women and children including general physicals, medication dispensing, Pap smears and dental care.

"It is an amazing experience to see your classmates make the leap from student to practitioner and to watch the second-year students get their first exposure to operating a clinic," said John M. Davitt, a fourth-year medical student and co-organizer of the trip. "The level of compassion, teamwork and enthusiasm that everyone displayed throughout the week was truly inspiring and was responsible for making this such a successful brigade."

Aaron M. Dom, a fourth-year student who also served as co-organizer, said the team traveled daily six hours roundtrip to a remote community where they provided health care to hundreds every day.

"I'm very impressed and proud of our team's work. What surprised me most was how much our group gained from this trip. We went to Honduras with a purpose of providing care to the people without health care access, but I think we actually ended up with an even more rewarding experience than the patients," he said.

The Honduras mission has become an annual event for Marshall medical students interested in global health care and is the outgrowth of an initiative to memorialize a Marshall School of Medicine graduate who lost his life in the September 2001 terrorist attacks.

An endowed fund honoring Paul W. Ambrose, MUSOM Class of 1995, significantly underwrites the annual mission trip. Ambrose's parents, Dr. Kenneth and Sharon Ambrose, also have personally supported the international medical trips. And Sharon Ambrose, a retired nurse, has traveled with the team three times.

Donations of medical supplies and medications from Marshall Health, the Marshall University School of Pharmacy and the School of Medicine's annual Mission M-Possible 5K also helped support the trip.

here I am, trying to wind down and spend time with my family, and she is constantly looking for new ways we can help Marshall. But that's how she's always been; she just knows the right thing to do. She has enabled me to help make things better for the people around us and to bring a level of health care to our region that wouldn't have existed otherwise, but not without sacrifice. She has always put others before herself."

In their limited free time, the Hatfields enjoy traveling and serving at their church in Charleston. Described by Monica as "Mr. Fix-It Man," Hatfield also enjoys woodworking, home improvement projects and working on cars.

Dr. and Mrs. Hatfield spend as much time as possible with their three daughters, two twin granddaughters and three grandsons.

"Since our kids were little, all we asked was for them to be the best they could be," Hatfield said. "Work and study as hard as you can, and be as kind to others as you can be.
Just do the best you can for those around you."

And, as the hundreds of lives the Hatfields have touched would attest, that is a life lesson worth remembering.

"Dr. Hatfield devotes himself to his patients, his colleagues and his community," Jamerson said. "He is not only a wonderful doctor, but he is also one of the most generous people I've ever had the pleasure of meeting – maybe only surpassed by his wife, Monica."

Dr. Friedman and the Childhood Obesity Conference

he Marshall University Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine hosted its first childhood obesity conference Oct. 2, 2013, at the Big Sandy Superstore Arena Grand Ballroom.

The day-long conference featured keynote speaker Jeffrey M. Friedman, M.D., Ph.D., discoverer of the obesity gene, leptin.

Friedman is the 2010 recipient of the Albert Lasker Basic Medical Research Award, which honors scientists whose fundamental investigations have provided techniques, information or concepts contributing to the elimination of major causes of disability and death. He is a professor at The Rockefeller University and an investigator with the Howard Hughes Medical Institute.

"We are extremely pleased that Dr. Friedman and our other guests joined us for this inaugural conference on obesity," said



Dr. Joseph I. Shapiro, dean of the School of Medicine. "Statistics show that our state leads the nation in the number of children who are obese. These numbers are staggering, and we must develop collaborative partnerships to tackle what is truly an epidemic in West Virginia."

Shapiro said the goal of the conference was to explore the synergy between research and community programs already in place, as well as to establish the framework for an obesity prevention institute at the school. He commended Dr. Nader G. Abraham, vice dean for research, for developing the conference.

"Dr. Abraham's vision for creating a conference that brings together professionals from the research, clinical, community and public policy areas is far reaching in that it gives us a solid foundation on which we can build future programs geared toward achieving better health outcomes for all."

Marshall University School of Medicine approved for psychiatry residency program

arshall University's Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine has been awarded initial accreditation by the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education (ACGME) to offer a psychiatry residency training program beginning in 2015. The ACGME is the national body responsible for post-M.D. training programs in the United States.

"The addition of a psychiatry residency training program allows us to continue our mission of educating a physician workforce for central Appalachia," Shapiro said. "Physicians tend to practice in the geographic area where they complete their residency training which translates to more doctors for our region."

Dr. Paulette S. Wehner, vice dean for graduate medical education, said the four-year program will train up to four residents a year for a total of 16 resident physicians at capacity.

"The development of a psychiatry residency program is certainly advantageous for West Virginia as well as the Tri-State," Wehner said. "The mental health care system is strained by the number of people who need help and a shortage of psychiatrists to meet that need. The situation has reached a crisis point, and under the direction of the new chairman of the department of psychiatry and

behavioral medicine, Dr. Suzanne Holroyd, the creation of this new residency will allow Marshall to address this crisis."

Holroyd, who joined Marshall in January from the University of Virginia School of Medicine,

says the new program will have outstanding training in psychiatry due to community collaboration as well as recruitment of new department of psychiatry faculty.

"We have worked collaboratively with the area's facilities and providers to build a residency program that will provide state-of-the-art training in psychiatry, which will ultimately translate into improved access and psychiatric care for the entire region," Holroyd said. "I am grateful to our community partners for their dedication to making this residency program a reality for Marshall."

With the addition of the psychiatry residency, the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine offers a total of eight residency programs in Family and Community Health, Internal Medicine, Medicine/Pediatrics, Obstetrics/Gynecology, Orthopaedic Surgery, Pediatrics and Surgery. Additionally there are five fellowship training programs which include Cardiology, Endocrinology, Interventional Cardiology, Medical Oncology and Pulmonary.

He is also the co-director and co-developer of the Paul Wesley Ambrose Health Policy Residency Track, the nation's first health policy track within a family medicine residency program.

Walden will continue teaching at the School of Medicine and assist the dean's office with special projects. Walden was appointed chairman in 2008 and has worked for decades in the fields of rural medicine and international health.

Marshall University and the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine launch accelerated BS/MD program for West Virginia students

r. Joseph I. Shapiro, dean of the Marshall University Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine, announced creation of an accelerated program that allows students to earn a bachelor's degree and a doctor of medicine in seven years, compared to the traditional eight years.

The program, open to academically qualified West Virginia students, is now accepting applications for the 2015 fall semester. The MCAT, medical education's traditional entrance exam, will be waived for students who successfully complete the undergraduate requirements of the program. In addition, those who successfully finish the undergraduate portion of the program also will receive a tuition waiver for all four years of medical school.

"Marshall is dedicated to developing a physician workforce for this region," Shapiro said. "One of the ways we can facilitate that goal is to create programs that attract our state's best and brightest. This accelerated program allows us to place those highly performing students on a fast track to medical education."

Jennifer T. Plymale, associate dean for admissions at the School of Medicine, said the collaborative program provides an exciting alternative for high-achieving students.

"Both Marshall University and the School of Medicine realize the importance of providing unique academic programs that tap into what students need and want," Plymale said. "By working with our recruiting and admissions colleagues on the main campus, as well as the

College of Science and Honors College, we were able to identify an educational niche and create a joint program that is tailor-made for West Virginia students who want to pursue a medical degree."

Eric K. Hardin, M.A., has been named program coordinator for the newly created initiative. He joined the School of Medicine in January 2014 with 14 years of experience in adult and higher education at Ashland Community & Technical College and Mountwest Community & Technical College.

Plymale congratulated Hardin and School of Medicine team members Christi L. Adkins, Deborah H. Curry, Amber M. Vance and Cindy A. Warren, who, along with representatives from the Honors College and College of Science, have spent the last year designing the program.

Admission requirements include a minimum ACT score of 30/1330-1350 SAT and an ACT math score of 27 or SAT equivalent of 610, a cumulative high school GPA of 3.75

on a 4.0 scale, three letters of recommendation and an on-campus interview.

Students accepted into the program will follow an accelerated undergraduate program in biological sciences. Once they successfully complete their first year of medical school, they will receive their bachelor's degrees.

In addition to its M.D. program, Marshall's School of Medicine also offers an M.D./Ph.D. program for those students with an interest in research.

WHITE COAT Ceremony

Begun in 1995, the White Coat Ceremony is designed to mark the transition into the medical profession and the beginning of the student's journey to becoming a doctor. During the ceremony, new students receive the white coats that symbolize their future profession and take a pledge to provide care that is both skilled and compassionate.

While recognizing that medicine is a scientific endeavor, the White Coat Program emphasizes the more humanistic aspects that are sometimes described as the art of medicine. By publicly articulating these values, such as respect for patients and compassionate care giving at the beginning of their medical education, the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine provides a strong, values-based foundation for their future.

The Derfect Fit

SOM Seniors Learn Their Future at Match Day 2014

sixty-seven Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine graduating seniors found out March 24 where they will train for the next three to seven years via the annual National Residency Matching Program (NRMP).

Marshall's students and their counterparts nationwide opened sealed envelopes at the stroke of noon which contained their residency decisions. Joined by family, friends and School of Medicine faculty and staff, the students gathered for a class luncheon prior to the noon reveal.

"We are delighted that our soon-to-be graduates have matched at dynamic programs across the United States," said Dr. Marie Veitia, the former associate dean of student affairs. "The Class of 2014 has distinguished itself with students matching into highly competitive specialties like dermatology, emergency medicine, orthopedic surgery and ophthalmology, in addition to prestigious programs in primary care."

More than 43 percent of the class members are entering into primary care fields like family medicine, pediatrics and internal medicine. Additionally, about one-third of the class will stay in West Virginia for their training, 11 of them at Marshall. Five students matched into psychiatry residencies—the highest number of students in the history of the school to have chosen that specialty. Six Marshall seniors also matched earlier this year in the U.S. Military Match.

The NRMP reports that 16,399 U.S. allopathic medical school seniors matched to first-year residency positions. The match connects graduating seniors with graduate medical programs across the country using an algorithm which pairs the preferences of applicants with the preferences of residency programs resulting in a best result for graduating students.

Investiture ceremony honors latest medical school graduates

ixty-seven medical students received their Doctor of Medicine degrees May 9 in the Investiture Ceremony of Marshall University's Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine at the Keith-Albee Performing Arts Center.


Marshall University President Stephen J. Kopp, Ph.D., who was among the speakers, conferred the students' degrees.

Graduates of the Class of 2014 include 11 students who have maintained perfect 4.0 GPAs as well as six students who will continue their military service at military residency programs across the country. The students have matched into highly competitive residency specialties like dermatology, orthopedics and ophthalmology, as well as prestigious programs in primary care.

This year's investiture speaker was Robert C. Gallo, M.D., co-discoverer of the human immunodeficiency virus that causes AIDS. Gallo, who since 1996 has served as the Director of Human Virology and Professor of Medicine and Microbiology and Immunology at the University of Maryland School of Medicine, is also credited with identifying the first human retrovirus and with others showed it was a cause of a particular form of human leukemia.

He has been awarded 31 honorary doctorates from universities around the world and received an honorary Doctor of Science degree at the Marshall ceremony.

TAKING CHARGE

hen Dr. Nancy B. Norton, Class of 1999, is asked why she feels so strongly about giving back to the Marshall University Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine, her answer is simple.

"Going to medical school changed my life," she said.
"It created a rewarding, successful career for me, and I'm grateful for that. It benefits me – and anybody else who graduated from here – for the medical school to continue to grow and develop and make a name for itself. When people say, 'I graduated from the Marshall University School of Medicine,' they should be proud."

Norton took over the reins as president of the School of Medicine Alumni Association July 1, replacing outgoing president Dr. Paulette S. Wehner, Class of 1989. BothWehner and Norton are not only alumni but also faculty of the School of Medicine. Norton is an associate

professor in the Department of Anatomy and Pathology, and Dr. Wehner is a cardiologist and vice dean for graduate medical education.

"It is unique to be alumni as well as active faculty," Wehner said. "It makes your dedication to the school pretty passionate."

"It is fun and rewarding to watch our students evolve into doctors," Norton said. "I work with the second-year students, and they are really beginning to think like doctors. I enjoy watching that transition happen."

Wehner's term as president began in 2012, the same year Dr. Joseph I. Shapiro was named dean of the School of Medicine. Wehner worked with Linda Holmes, director of development and alumni affairs for the School of Medicine, to strengthen the alumni's relationship with current students.

"It has been rewarding to work with Linda – who is truly the heart and soul of the alumni association – on moving the association forward and engaging the alumni in student

support," Wehner said. "It has also been rewarding to see Dr. Shapiro's involvement and his understanding of the need to engage alumni."

Norton said she hopes to build on Wehner's efforts by further increasing the participation of alumni in the medical school, both through monetary contributions that will increase scholarship funds and through numerous other opportunities to give back.

"The medical school can certainly use the support of the alumni, but the alumni can also benefit from staying connected to the medical school," she said. "Beyond monetary contributions, there are many other ways for people to stay involved. Alumni come back and lecture, they give grand rounds and sometimes they even

join our faculty. Staying active in the alumni association keeps all of those opportunities open."

Staying connected also allows alumni to see the many ways the medical school has changed and improved over the years.

"Things have changed tremendously, even just in the 15 years since I attended," Norton said. "I think people would be very proud to see how our medical school has grown."

For Norton, what makes the alumni of the Marshall University School of Medicine unique is that they are a relatively small, tight-knit group.

"Although right now our incoming class size is 79, Marshall is still a small medical school," she said. "When I was a medical student, our class size was around 50 students, and we all knew each other well. I think that is what sets us apart from larger medical schools – we have

fond memories of our classmates because we were a small group that knew each other quite well."

For Wehner, the admission of legacy students in recent

years speaks volumes about the Marshall School of Medicine as well as its alumni.

"Marshall remains a fairly young medical school even today," she said. "One thing very special to me is that we are starting to see the children of alumni come through Marshall. I can't think of a higher compliment than wanting your children to attend the medical school you attended."

The Marshall University Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine is well equipped for a bright future, and Norton is prepared to carry out the alumni association's mission to help advance and influence the interest of the School of Medicine, to support current students on their journey to

becoming physicians and to provide

programs and opportunities for alumni to connect with each other and the School of Medicine.

"Dr. Norton is completely dedicated to our medical students and has developed her career around educating them, and I cannot think of a better person for the job," Wehner said. "Every alumnus had a professor who made a difference or a resident who made a difference – and any time alumni can give back to today's students, it is not only a good feeling but is also largely what Marshall's medical school is all about."

Three School of Medicine graduates among those honored at annual Alumni Awards Banquet

hree School of Medicine graduates were among those honored at the Marshall University Alumni Association's 77th Annual Alumni Awards Banquet, sponsored by Ohio Valley Bank, April 25-26. Below is a list of those who were honored.

Distinguished Alumnus Award *Eric R. George, M.D.*

Dr. Eric R. George is a hand surgeon practicing medicine in Louisiana. A native of Huntington and a graduate of Huntington East High School, he received his medical degree from Marshall. He completed a General Trauma Surgery Residency at Michigan State University, then completed a fellowship in Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery at Grand Rapids Area Medical Education Center in Grand Rapids, Michigan. George currently is Clinical Assistant Professor in the Department of Surgery at Tulane University School of Medicine in New Orleans, Louisiana, and adjunct assistant professor of orthopaedics in the Department of Orthopaedics at Tulane. His practice, the Hand Center of Louisiana, is a state-of-the-art facility which treats NFL players and key players in the oil and gas industries, among other businesses, and is the largest in the Gulf South region. He owns a luxury hospital, the Omega Hospital, and several ambulatory surgery centers, urgent care clinics and assisted living centers.

He earned his undergraduate degree - a Bachelor of Science in chemistry - in 1985, and graduated from MU's School of Medicine in 1989. His success has not come easily. At Marshall, he was diagnosed with dyslexia and reading at barely a high school level. Dr. Pat Brown, associate was dean of academic and student affairs, said, "Still, he was getting Cs where others were failing. I caught a glimpse of what must be phenomenal intelligence." George still calls Huntington home. "We still like to get a Stewart's hot dog and a Tudor's biscuit and go to a Marshall game," he said. Last year, a Marshall University Society of Yeager Scholarship was provided by George in memory of his late brother, Aaron C. George, a fighter pilot who was killed in a crash. Through his philanthropic endeavors, Eric George is a major contributor to many causes including the St. Martin's Episcopal School George Cottage, for early education of preschool children in New Orleans, Louisiana, and through his children's foundation. Chloe and Cassidy George developed a school for orphans in Mombasa, Kenya.

Carolyn B. Hunter Distinguished Faculty Service Award *Adam M. Franks, M.D.*

Dr. Adam M. Franks is an associate professor in the Department of Family and Community Health at the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine. A 1994 graduate of the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine, Franks completed a residency in family medicine at Marshall and a fellowship in advanced maternal care (surgical obstetrics) at the University of Tennessee-Memphis. Franks has served as an assistant scoutmaster and medical officer for the Tri-State Area Boy Scout Council, is an active member and elder at Highlawn Presbyterian Church and a volunteer coach for the Wayne County Youth Soccer League.

Marshall University School of Medicine R. Mark Hatfield, O.D., M.D.

R. Mark Hatfield, O.D., M.D., F.A.C.S., is founder and managing member of Retina Consultants PLLC in Charleston. After earning a doctor of optometry from Illinois College of Optometry, he received his M.D.

from the Marshall University School of Medicine in 1983. He completed a surgical internship at Marshall, an ophthalmology residency at the University of Illinois School of Medicine and a vitreoretinal fellowship at Rush Presbyterian St. Luke's in Chicago. Hatfield has been honored with numerous awards over his career, including Outstanding Student Awards in 1980 and 1981, and was elected to membership in the Alpha Omega Alpha Honor Society while at Marshall. Last year, he received the Illinois Eye and Ear Infirmary Distinguished Alumnus Award and was named by the Marshall University Joan C. It is rare for one person to leave a mark on so many, but as anyone in the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine knows, Cindy Warren has done just that.

However, this is not the first time a scholarship has been endowed in Cindy's honor. In 2011, an anonymous graduate endowed the Cynthia A. Warren Medical Student Scholarship, which is awarded to an entering medical student from West Virginia.

"It was such a shock," Warren said. "It was hard to imagine I had that kind of effect on one of our graduating students. It's been really amazing to work with such fine human beings that we've accepted over the years."

cademic scholarships are the bread and butter of every development program because they literally assist students with the basics of attending medical school. We are forever grateful for those who help support the mission of the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine. Here is a chronological listing of scholarships created over the past year.

- The Peggy (Margaret) Theis Scholarship is a scholarship fund established by the family of Peggy Theis, a longtime employee of the School of Medicine who died in 2013. In creating the scholarship, her family noted Peggy's compassion and interest in others which was exhibited through her daily service to students, faculty and staff. Once fully endowed, the scholarship will be awarded to a female, first-year medical student who will be the first physician in her family and has a financial need as per standards set by the Office of Student Financial Assistance.

In creating the scholarship, the family requested the recipient be a first-year medical student who has a strong academic record and a common-sense grasp of and use of academic and clinical material. The award is renewable for three years pending normal academic progress.
- The Dr. Franklin D. Shuler Expendable Scholarship is a scholarship fund established by Cynthia Howe Murray and Thomas J. Murray in honor of Dr. Shuler for outstanding medical care. The recipient of this one-time award will be a fourth-year medical student who has demonstrated an

interest in orthopaedics. The award will be given for five years.

- The Dr. Mark and Monica Hatfield "Adopt a Medical Student" fund is endowed by Dr. R. Mark Hatfield, Class of 1983, and Mrs. Monica Hatfield, both loyal supporters of the School of Medicine. The award is renewable for three additional years pending normal academic progress.

Dr. Kimberly A. Burgess, a 1992 graduate of the Joan C. Edwards School of Medicine, has created a scholarship at the school in memory of her father, Clyde Albert Burgess, M.D. The Clyde Albert Burgess, M.D., Scholarship will be awarded to a medical student who is a resident of southern






