Guidelines for Student Evaluation of Professionalism

Examples of Professional Behavior Include:

- 1. Possesses integrity and maintains high personal standards, represents SOM well
- 2. Demonstrates collegiality (considerate, compassionate, and respectful)
- 3. Demonstrates a positive attitude toward learning (participates, shows enthusiasm, uses constructive criticism to improve, strives for excellence
- 4. Demonstrates initiative and self-motivation by showing up prepared to learn; willingness to contribute to the learning of others
- 5. Reliability-can be counted on to be punctual, to complete assignments
- 6. Accountability-willingness to accept responsibility, attends required student activities, follows stated rules (evaluations, dress code in Clinical Skills Lab or other clinical setting)
- 7. Shows evidence of interest in learning over aggressive drive to earn higher grades
- 8. Contacts appropriate personnel in a timely fashion when issues arise that affect student's attendance (e.g., accident, illness, extraordinary family issues)
- 9. Demonstrates the appropriate balance between humility and confidence in one's ability; knows his/her limitations, absence of arrogance; willingness to seek help
- 10. Demonstrates maturity in response to challenges, willingness to ask for help

Examples of Unprofessional Behavior Include:

- 1. Conducts himself/herself at the bare minimum that reflects mediocrity and a lack of awareness that excellence in the goal
- 2. Demonstrates passivity or lack of interest in learning
- 3. Challenges the authority of a faculty member by crossing the line between an assertive inquiry and aggressive, accusatory manner of inquiry
- 4. Inappropriate drive for higher grades that results in disruption and lack of respect that suggests the student is more interested in grades than learning
- 5. Displays superiority and self-importance
- 6. Demonstrates a negative attitude (e.g., frequent complaining, inciting others to complain, does not represent the SOM well
- 7. Makes appointments with faculty and/or staff and failing to show up
- 8. Rude behavior to faculty, staff, classmates, and/or standardized patients
- 9. Repeated episodes of tardiness to class or to exams that disrupt the classroom, failure to turn in assignments in a timely fashion; failure to comply with required behaviors (attendance at activities, dress code in clinical skills lab or clinical setting
- 10. Dishonesty or being complicit in dishonesty
