

Whooping Cough: Bacteria Isolated


Belgian scientists Jules Bordet (1870-1961) and Octave Gengou (1875-1957) isolated the bacterium *Bordetella pertussis*, the causative agent of pertussis (whooping cough), which they had first observed in 1900. It would later also come to be known as the Bordet-Gengou bacillus.



The Amick Business.

At a meeting of the Marion County Medical Society, Indianapolis, Ind., held January 2, Dr. Brayton presented the following resolutions adopted by the Philadelphia County Medical Society, October 28, 1893, which were adopted unanimously by the Society:

WHEREAS, Dr. James E. Reeves, of Chattanooga, having denounced the so-called "Amick Cure" for consumption as a quack nostrum and stated that its proprietor was not a physician in good and regular standing, was accused of criminal libel; and whereas, the grand jury has ignored the indictment brought against him; be it

Resolved, That the Marion County Medical Society congratulates Dr. Reeves on his bravery, a bravery unfortunately too rare at





Retolved, That no person who makes, deals in, or advertises as a cure a quack nostrum—that is to say, a preparation the composition of which is kept secret—can be termed a physician in good and regular standing, because such action is *ipse facto* sufficient to cause forfeiture of membership in this or any other county medical society governed by the laws of the American Medical Association.

Resolved, That a copy of these resoluthus, duly attested with the signature of the president and secretary and with the seal of the society, be forwarded to Dr. Reeves, and that they be handed to the press for publication.

One advantage of the above resolutions, aside from the vindication of Dr. Reeves, is that they define from one of the highest sources the nature of a nostrum, "a preparation the composition of which is kept a secret." To deal in or advertise such preparations as cures is sufficient to cause forfeiture of membership in any society governed by the laws of the American Medical Association.


Appalling indifference of members

 Now what am I to do to get them to deliver the goods? There have been times in the last few years when I felt determined to resign as secretary and let the society get along as best it can.





- It might be added that there were six telephone calls per day on an average, classified as emergency calls, into the Kanawha County Medical Society emergency call system.

 After much discussion, Dr. John Stone made the motion that "it be recommended that the Society go on call in consecutive order, mandatory, to answer any emergency call and that all men up to the age of 55 be placed on call; those men over age 55 to volunteer for the call service."

 The tour of duty was made from eight o'clock am until eight o'clock am.



High Court Rules Abortions Legal the First 3 Months



- Whereas, the Supreme Court of the United States, in their historic ruling of January 22, 1973, virtually removed all restrictions from the performance of abortion on demand, and,
- Whereas, by their ruling they subjugated all rights of the unborn baby to those of the mother, and,
- Whereas, Physicians have had as their primary concern, and have indeed gone to great effort, to preserve life both before and after birth,...



- Resolved, that the CCMS, in regular meeting March 14, 1974, go on record as recommending that abortions be performed only for sound medical reason, and be it further...
- Resolved, that we recommend to all legislative bodies that laws should protect the rights of all physicians, hospitals, nurses and other medical personnel, for moral, ethical or other reasons, to refuse to participate in the performance of abortion, and be it further...
- Resolved, that these resolutions be released to the local news media and copies sent to our national legislators.

Why Morgantown?

- Dr. Brown asked for the Secretary to read a letter from the Monongalia Medial Society, asking that the Cabell County Medical Society consider the vicinity of the University of West Virginia, located in Morgantown, as the site for the proposed four year medical college.
- Dr. Wilkerson then moved that the CCMS should go on record as approving... seconded from the floor.
- Dr. Sarah Louise Stevens spoke against Dr. Wilkinson's motion, and presented many reasons why the medical school should be located in Huntington.
- Dr. Wilkerson asked that his motion be withdrawn.

 Dr. Albert Esposito spoke about the progress for a medical school at Marshall. Dr. Esposito's hard work and obvious sincerity about this issue were acknowledged by everyone. His talk generated much enthusiasm and discussion.

• Dr. Charles McKown then introduced two resolutions:

- The CCMS goes on record that it endorses and actively supports the efforts to establish a medical school at the Huntington Veteran's Administration Hospital and Marshall University
- The resolutions were both passed unanimously.
