



Predatory Publishing

Refers to a questionable business practice of charging fees to authors to publish their articles without standard editorial and publishing services provided by legitimate scholarly journals.

Warning Signs:

- Flattering email with poor language and typos
- Journal Title sounds similar to reputable publication, uses prestigious sounding terms, might be hijacked from legitimate academic journal
- Website has many mistakes or is 'under construction'
- Absence of Metrics & Indexing
- Not a clear article/peer review process
- Negative Reputation
