- Biomedical, clinical, and translational research and education at JCESOM focuses on the most prevalent WV and Central Appalachian Health disparities:
 - 1. Obesity and its complications:
 - Diabetes
 - Hypertension
 - Dyslipidemia
 - Heart attack
 - Stroke
 - Certain cancers
 - Metabolic syndrome
 - Fatty liver disease
 - 2. Addiction







Prevalence of obesity 2020-2022 (CDC)

- Over the last several years (2018-2023), medical school grant awards have increased by almost 100% to currently more than \$20 million annually.
- Extramural support has been from a variety of sources including federal (NIH, Veteran's Affairs, NASA, USDA), national societies (American Heart, PhRMAF, Pew, etc) and WV State (DHHR, HEPC).
- Types of grants vary from individual educational grants to students (AHA, NASA), to individual research grants to faculty (R15, R01, VA Merit, VA Senior Clinician Investigator Award) to multimillion dollar regional educational grants (INBRE) to multimillion dollar institutional research grants to study WV health disparities such as obesity and its complications (COBRE).

 - Medical Student research participation has increased from below 15% to more than 75% annually!
 - Last Research Day had more than 150 student presentations!!

- <u>Increase clinician participation</u> in clinical research across MHN, St. Mary's, River Health
- Increase both individual and programmatic (PCORI, HRSA) grant funding from all agencies, especially VA
- Further increase <u>Medical Student research participation</u> to enhance residency options and for SOM LCME reaccreditation.
- Enhance regional and institutional (across the university)
 <u>collaboration</u> research and graduated education
 (Health Informatics, Health Journalism, Cyber Health Security)







- The Council may provide input or take action at the request of the Dean or administrative staff within its mandate.






